With passion, patience and purpose, the social activist is able to deal with any challenges that come along during his journey. It is the sincere desire of Benjie that social entrepreneurship will be the future development of social service in Singapore and we're honoured to hear Benjie's experiences in the social sector over the past 16 years. Read on to find out!



About yourself

1. Can you tell us something about yourself?

I graduated from Nantah with a Bachelor of Commerce (Honours) in 1980. Upon graduation, I landed my first job in the finance industry at Post Office Savings Bank (POSB) and stayed on for 7 years before moving to United Overseas Bank (UOB).

In 1990, I ventured into start up – PA Consulting, a boutique PR consultancy firm. In 2002, I co-founded Dr WHO Waterworks and successfully grew the company into a major drinking water bottling company in Singapore.

In 2006, I went into my first social sector role as the first non-Indian CEO of Sree Narayana Mission Home. Since then, I've been in the social sector, contributing to different organisations including Ren Ci Hospital, Red Cross, World Toilet Organisation, Sian Chay Medical Institution and Mendaki Sense. Now I am with the Singapore Association of the Visually Handicapped (SAVH) as Executive Director.

2. If we ask your close friends, how would they describe you?

They would describe me as a compassionate social entrepreneur striving to serve the social service with dedication.

3. Why did you choose to study at NTU?

Just before I ORD, I opted to switch from the University of Singapore to Nantah as I fell in love with the Jurong Campus and preferred the course combination offered by Nantah in the Commerce Faculty.

4. What's your fondest memory as an NTU student? Any exciting or unforgettable experiences?

University days were super enriching for me as I actively participated in extracurricular activities during Nantah days!

The overseas exchange programmes were the most exciting for me. In 1977, I was awarded the JAL Summer Course scholarship to study at the International Colleague of Sophia University in Tokyo, Japan. The following year, I was presented with the opportunity to represent Singapore in the Ship for Southeast Asian Youth programme and was awarded the Best Speaker Award in their Debate series. The experience co-living with undergraduates of different nationalities also made up those unforgettable memories.

5. What made you join NTU Alumni Club?

My classmate from Nantah invited me to join the Club. The purpose of joining was to have fellowship with my friends and the opportunity to network with people from different walks of life. I hope that more alumni could make use of the Club to expand their network.

About your work

1. Why did you get into the social service sector?

I was influenced by my father, along with my natural affinity for community service. I saw how my father actively contributed to the community when I was young and I said to myself that this is what we should be doing.



2. Out of the social service organisations which you have worked with, which is the most special / enriching?

I have joined several social service organisations, including being the first non-Muslim Executive Director of Mendaki Sense. The most enriching experience would be with Sian Chay Medical Institution as their Executive Director. Sian Chay Medical Institution is a Traditional Chinese Medicine chain that provides free medical treatment and medicine for the poor. With the success of fundraising projects organised during my 7 years in the organisation, more outlets could be funded and opened to serve the needy.

3. What motivated you during your social service journey?

It warms my heart to see that the beneficiary is able to improve in life and live in harmony with the family and community. That is what keeps me going.

4. What's the biggest challenge you faced as a social worker?

The biggest challenge is actually not fundraising. It is to make the beneficiary accept their current condition and realise their need for help. Only with that, can they live in harmony with others. Some beneficiaries questioned, "Why am I born blind?" Overcoming the mental barrier and acceptance of their condition is the first step. Then, to them, befriending is more important than material care. After you successfully befriend them, then they can trust you more and be more willing to listen and share with you.

5. In your opinion, what do you think are the 3 main requirements of a good social worker?

Well, the prerequisites are (1) Passion. Without passion, they can't last more than three years. (2) Patience. As results are not seen overnight, patience is important so that one could endure to see the results. (3) Professionalism. Whatever we do, we do it well and good. Be it in communication or technology, upskilling is also important to stay relevant and to improve the work rendered to the beneficiaries.

6. What is your wish and aspiration for the future development of the social service sector in Singapore?

In social service, there are three sectors – Public, Private and People. We need the public and private sectors to work together to support or kickstart a project. If the public sector (government) could kickstart the project by providing sufficient funds, it will help to sustain, develop and scale to greater heights. The private sector could then engage the people's sector and render their support through their resources. As a little goes a long way, the more the number of organisations involved, the better it would be.

Others

1. What goals are you actively seeking to accomplish this year?

To help people with visual impairment have better employability and reach a higher employment rate. There are not enough people accepting them.

2. What is your favourite quote in life?

Taken from the Junior Chamber International's creed – 'Service to humanity is the best work of life'.

3. Is there a person you admire the most? Who and why?

The person that I admire the most is definitely my father. Нe was a street hawker with low income but he participated in community giving. Giving is not just about donating money. You can also give what you have. My father was poor but he donated fresh



vegetables to the convent every weekend. I'm impressed by his act of philanthropy and his heart to help even when he is not rich. I also witnessed hawkers coming together to help their fellow hawkers in need. This is the community spirit. As a saying goes; anonymous charity is the best kind of charity.

4. If you could leave an inspirational message to the readers, what would that be?

One of Singapore's shared values; "Society above self".

Harmony, respect, purity, and silence

An oft-quoted proverb from the Japanese tea master Sen no Rikyū are the four elements of harmony, respect, purity, and silence. Together, they represent the core spirit in the way of tea.



If I had to describe one memorable tea that I've tasted to date, it would be a 50-year old Pu'er tea sipped

slowly from a Ming-dynasty Blanc de Chine tea cup. This happened during a presentation at the Brussels tea exposition in early spring when it was still clammy and cold outside. The sensation on the palate was unreal as the deep amber tea liquor seemed to coat the entirety of your mouth, as rich as butter yet as light as a feather at the same time. There was a lot of depth and purity in the profile of a high-quality aged Pu'er tea and this was an experience made possible only by its quality at production and clean storage conditions. The strong salivation that followed brought about a deep sense of harmony in my being where nothing remains on the palate. Slurping a delectable Cantonese double-boiled soup would come close to this tea tasting experience since the inherently flavoursome and nutritious soup only indulges the senses without overwhelming them.

Versatility holds the key to a successful tea pairing experience

When it comes to the subject of tea and mooncake pairing, it is necessary to study the ingredients of the foods that you have selected as well as the taste profile of your tea. Are you enjoying baked or snow skin mooncakes? Does the tea cut through the sweetness of your mooncakes, bringing emphasis

to the flavoursome notes that the pastry chef hopes to deliver? Is there harmony in your tasting notes leaving behind a lingering sweetness? Is the concentration of the tea infusion too light or too heavy?

Many parameters are at play here, and a tea sommelier equipped with versatile skill sets will be able to navigate this landscape of ever changing scents, flavours, and tastes effortlessly. For most sweets and pastries

including mooncakes, black teas are almost the default goto pairing that comes immediately to mind. However, they may not always be the best fit here. This mid-autumn

festival, we will explore tea and mooncake pairing with highly fermented oolong teas from the high mountains of Taiwan and Fujian, China at 1,200 m and 2,158 m elevation respectively.

Generally speaking, I lean towards heavily fermented teas cultivated at higher elevations that have undergone medium and slow roasting. The dry scents are strong and complex with significant notes of ripened and dried fruits accompanied by white flower scented honied notes. Sweetness builds up layer upon layer until it coats the whole mouth. The qualities of high mountain oolongs include a powerful aftertaste, lingering sweetness, and lots of clarity accompanied by brilliant colours in your tea cup! Teas of this nature represent the social butterflies at any dining event. They possess a powerful sweetness that comes through with great clarity and versatility

that will pair well with most spice-laden dishes and desserts here in Southeast Asia.

- We will study the most prized tea cultivar from Taiwan where students will not only get to study the leaf specimen up close, but will have a chance to brew the same tea and experience Cha Qi from the unique terroir of Lishan at 2080 metres above sea level.
- An introduction to high mountain oolong teas from Taiwan's top peaks.

Course Objectives

- 1. Growing into the shoes of a discerning consumer.
- 2. Finding modern day relevance in ancient practices.
- 3. Refinement of palates.
- 4. Appreciating the differences that terroir and leaf cultivars can make to your teas.
- 5. Calibrating your palates based on privately sourced tea sample standards from around the world.

More information will be finalised at this year's mid-autumn festival. See you there!



For baked mooncakes with lotus paste, Shuixian tea made from old tea bushes are a great match for this mooncake option. A yuzu osmanthus snowskin mooncake can be very fitting for a Dongding oolong. A pine-smoked Lapsang Souchong tea is potentially an ideal pairing

with the novel champagne truffle snow-skin mooncake or Earl Grey tea and crunchy pearl snow-skin mooncake. Another alternative is a full-bodied afternoon black tea. New mooncake flavours such as Yunnan dark brown sugar and rum truffle or Da Li rose and strawberry chocolate will go very well with a bug-bitten high mountain oolong tea.


Hui Zhen's favourite spot in NTU:


